### **PROFESSIONAL BACKGROUND**

Born in Stockholm, Sweden, Åsa Bittel (-Pettersson) obtained a Master of Laws (LL.M) in 1987 from Stockholm University Sweden.

Before joining the Swedish Bar in 2010, Åsa Bittel worked at the Court of International Arbitration (ICC) in Paris, European Free Trade Association (EFTA) in Geneva and during 20 years at an intellectual property firm where she was responsible for the fight against counterfeiting worldwide for a high-reputation house.

She has also served as the Swedish Government's representative to the Swedish School in Geneva.

She is accredited by the judicial authority in Geneva as a Swedish <-> French interpreter and translator.

In 2021, Åsa Bittel joined Eardley Avocats as an independent off counsel.

Under her original title "Advokat", Åsa Bittel works as a lawyer (advice and judicial) both in Switzerland and Sweden but also internationally. In Switzerland, she is admitted to the EU-EFTA lawyers list under the supervision of the Bar Commission of Lawyers in the canton of Geneva.
